Reflecting on 'Faith'

January 2017

A Sunday sermon on the topic of Faith, necessarily brief in order to fit with the liturgy, made me think about this topic. The meaning of Faith goes to the essence of being a Christian.as Luther taught us. Perhaps these comments will stimulate others to think about the subject of 'Faith', to ask questions as this congregation works with a new minister and explores priorities. Perhaps someone would like to add to, modify or share his own version of these comments. Finally, I offer these comments not as a proclamation from someone who thinks he/she is a particularly good Christian. I am certainly not.

First of all, it seems as if we sometimes confuse faith and belief. In many Christian sects, the preamble to the Creed goes something like, "let us confess our Faith." But is Creed the same as Faith, and are we entirely right to put so much emphasis on creed? Wasn't it Faith that moved Mary to accept being the mother of Jesus? As I read it, what she said was, "I cannot fully comprehend what is being asked of me, but here I am to do God's will." In our own lives, have we not sometimes had strong beliefs but fallen down on acting like Christians guided by love and faith? Perhaps for these, and a lot better and more reasons than I can think of, Luther proclaimed the pivotal importance of faith.

But what is Faith? This is where my reflection led me.

Faith and trust are different words in English, but they are rooted in the same word in Latin. They spring from the word *Fides*. Since Italian is more accessible to people today, let's look at their meaning in Italian. *Fede* is the Italian word for faith and for trust. Fede is the root for a lot of meanings:

- Fidare is to trust. It is also to lend. After all, would we lend our money to someone we do not trust?
- Fidarsi mean to trust in something or someone.
- Affidarsi is to put our trust, to throw our lot in with someone, some idea, some initiative. It implies membership as well.
- From Fede derive fidanzata and fidanzato, woman and man who promise themselves to each other in marriage, who promise to trust each other and to look after each other. Thus trust entails an obligation, a responsibility.
- Confidere is to rely on, to confide in someone, to entrust someone with a task.

Credere is different from fidare. Credere is to believe, to think, to imagine, to suppose, to understand, and only in a very loose sense, to trust. We would do well as a congregation to fidare. If congregation means that people gather together, we should gather to put faith in God and in each other, to rely on each other, to promise God and each other to fulfill our responsibilities. A pastor and a congregation need to trust in each other. Remember, trust also means responsibility.

The sermon also touched on the relationship between charity and trust, and stewardship. As I understood it, trust goes beyond charity. What we do for others, we should do with a sense of responsibility to those we try to help. Does it seem to you that, sometimes, when we do charitable acts, we see them as one-time deals? We see someone in need, something terrible, and we want to do something right away. It's natural, right?

But could it be that we have additional responsibilities? We cannot be everything to everyone everywhere. But, could we try to: Do more? Actually help someone or some group of people over time? Better know whom we are helping? Know their stories? Their actual needs? Laugh and grief with them? How as a small congregation might we contribute to the betterment of their own continuing lives? To understand that recipients of our generosity may want to enter into a mutual relationship with us? That sometimes, there may be ongoing responsibilities? Likewise, stewardship is not just about money. It is about a continuing responsibility.

So, what do we do about all this? We all want closure. When someone has a thought, we want that person to also give us the answer. I am unable to do that. But, perhaps, if we think together about the foregoing, we will have better questions for a future pastor, for our congregation, and for ourselves? Perhaps we can help a future pastor think about all this. Perhaps we can think together about it? Perhaps we can increase our faith? Perhaps we can be builders of trust and stewardship?

LCMS Stewardship Newsletter. May 2017

"It is more blessed to give than to receive," said St. Paul, quoting our Lord (Acts 20:35). How can this be?

Jesus and His disciples withdrew to a mountain by the shore of the Sea of Galilee. The crowds followed them, for the Lord had just showered upon them the gift of His teaching, the gift of His Word. But the day was waning; the sun was setting, and it was getting late. Looking upon the crowds, Jesus had compassion on them and asked, "Where are we to buy bread, so that these people may eat?" (John 6:5) Philip said that two hundred denarii (a day's wages for two hundred men) could not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.

But Andrew, Peter's brother, brought a young boy forward, who had five barley loaves and two small fish. "But," Andrew asked, "what are they for so many?" (John 6:9). Jesus replied, "Have the people sit down." (John 6:10)

Then Jesus, the Son of God, gave them a second gift, a gift from what only He could give—a gift from above. He took the bread and the fish, gave thanks, blessed them, and distributed them to the crowd. Then came the miracle. As these five loaves and two fish were given out, they multiplied. He fed the hungry crowd until they were all full. And twelve baskets full were left over.

But Jesus was not the only one who gave that day. There is one person who also gave from what he had. It was the boy with the five loaves and the two fish. All the others, including the boy, received the gift of a miraculous feast. And they would look back on it with wonder. But the boy, when he would look back on it, would look back and remember not just what he received. He would look back with wonder and delight when the Son of God made his gift into something miraculous. For it is more blessed to give than to receive.

This our Lord does for each of us. He presses our gifts, no matter how big or how small, into His service and works wonders with them. He provides through what we give: water for baptism, bread and wine for the Lord's Supper, a man called and sent for the preaching of the Gospel and Absolution. He provides a building in which we can gather as His children, lights so that we might not gather in darkness. He provides funds for the care of the poor and struggling, for missionaries who preach and teach beyond our borders. He makes Christians, disciples of our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ in our midst by bringing them to faith and nurturing them in that faith. He takes our gifts and turns them into something miraculous.

Indeed, it is more blessed to give than to receive. Thus we give. We give of what we have. And the Lord works His wonders.
